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From The Principal

I am coming to the end of my first five years as Principal and we are completing a four-year College Strategic Plan cycle.

And unsurprisingly, the strategy we choose for the College does mean something.

The big-ticket items of the **2020-23 Strategic Direction**, such as embracing the House System as the basis of Pastoral Care in our Secondary School, and carefully targeting student entrepreneurship, innovation and leadership, do change the school experience for our students.

Coupled with the finalisation of our 20-year **Campus Master Plan**, the design and implementation of **The Canterbury Way** – our research-based instructional framework for teachers, and evolving the way our parents and community engage with us via social media, the introduction of real-time **MyCC Reporting**, and there is evidence of considerable change here at Canterbury College.

At the time of writing, our new **2024-27 Strategic Direction**, which takes us to our 40th Anniversary, is almost ready to be launched.

We have taken the time to ensure our plans will make an impact and be bold enough, because they ought to be.

School education as we know it is under threat like never before in the compulsory attendance era.

Firstly, COVID changed families' expectations around school, which has seen sizeable movements into distance education, alternative schooling sites and home schooling.

Secondly, massive changes to how the Commonwealth Government funds Independent Schools have threatened the whole business model of schools.

Sadly, Canterbury has foregone almost \$5 million in the last three years since the formula used by the government to fund schools changed.

This is not money for fancy buildings as the media would often have you believe.

This is money for teacher salaries, electricity, cocurricular and academic programs, forcing us to pass on the effects to our parents and carers.

There are hundreds of schools across the country in the same position as us.

It is likely that Commonwealth school grants will continue to decrease for the indefinite future.

The third threat is the unrelenting swamp that is the increasingly alternate reality that our Gen Alpha and Millennial students are living on social media, a steady junk food diet of TikTok, Snapchat, Instagram and YouTube.

I say 'alternate reality' because most of the time, it exists in parallel to their actual life at school – an 'echo chamber' disconnected from their families and in the realm of their clubs, sports and performing arts activities.

It is regrettably, on balance, a narcissistic and self-absorbed world.

We know that brains are being rewired in line with how human biology always has shifted, to suit our lifestyles and behaviours.

Our young people are not in control of this change, and it must be said, neither are we.

The fourth threat has been the most profound, and I suspect there are very few principals who are not sharing their analysis on its impact.

I am referring to generative AI such as ChatGPT and all the other incarnations.

It is not like Wikipedia which undermined the grasp of the big encyclopedia conglomerates.

It is not like Siri, or Alexa, or Spotify, or Amazon, or the Netflix algorithms.

This is a time when the very purpose of education, in an era of adaptive AI, is under review.

What does it mean for basic school education, when every single learning activity and assessment that has ever been set by a teacher, can be reproduced and nuanced in 10 seconds by an AI bot?

It is a profound existential threat to the largely unchallenged industrial model of education.

Does this mean we no longer need to be able to write?

Some education futurists say we do not.

So what does an education look like when writing is not the building block of understanding?

Do we still need to understand the basics of arithmetic, calculations, statistics or maths logic?

Some say maybe not.

So what does a maths classroom look like without any expectation that we are numerate on our own terms?

So if we gave up assessing 'recall-based knowledge' years ago – like capital cities, the periodic table and mathematical formulae – which we did, what are we left with?

What are the building blocks of a school education that survive?

Many will say the answer lies in generic terms like 'thinking skills' or 'higher order thinking' or 'problem-solving skills'.

Adaptive AI can do all those things much quicker and more fully than us, and that is its superpower.

An AI platform can make inferences, decide which criteria are more important when making decisions, and learn your personal preferences based on your interactions.

It can handle creative tasks like writing songs, producing artwork, composing film scores, designing fashion, creating logos, editing photos, and writing speeches.

I have asked AI platforms to do all these things for me and they are okay.

So what if factual data, procedural information, thinking skills, higher order processes and creative tasks are all spoken for? What are we left with?

What will a teacher spend six hours a day doing with their class?

Will we wake up in 10 years and see schools as fundamentally redundant?



At Canterbury we see the future, and we think a traditional school education is still viable.

The tenets of a broad liberal education are different from 30 years ago, but that's okay.

The school is ultimately responsible for shaping fully formed humans after 13 years of formal education, but it will be a different formation.

What it means to be able to read is different, so our response must be different, particularly for the Secondary School.

13-year-olds have never read so many words per day in human history, but never been so singularly uninformed – and therefore, so prone to manipulation.

So it is critical reading, inferential reading, interpreting audiences, manipulation and discourse.

Canterbury believes that character education – a holistic approach to physical, intellectual, moral, spiritual and social wellbeing – will always be the role of schools.

We cannot rue what schools have been drawn into over the past decades, because it is critical work – in mental health, respectful relationships, consent education, cultural literacy and so on.

Our next Strategic Plan will re-engineer our wellbeing curriculum to be fully responsive to the world our students live in.

An academic education does not have impact if a young person is not well and not engaged.

This school will also continue to shape the landscape on the purpose of secondary schooling.

Our **Microcredentials Program** will begin with Years 9-10 in 2024 as a crucial plank in this vision.

Short, sharp, just-in-time, specialist courses aligned to our World Ready ethos, ranging from financial and political literacy, Anglican Church studies, personal branding and LinkedIn, graphic design, leadership, scaling a start-up idea, developing a repertoire of 10 nutritious meals, cultural literacy, world religions, car maintenance, languages.

These are all on the table for our students – and they must be. If not us, then who?

For now, they will sit alongside our traditional curriculum, but a new curriculum footprint is needed.

We will spend 2024 researching and planning a brand new, modern, interesting and World Ready Year 9 curriculum which will engage and inspire our students.

In 2025, this curriculum will become the first year of the Canterbury World Ready Diploma (WRD).

The WRD will be a bespoke qualification, planned over four years from Year 9 to Year 12, with reference to QCE attainment, outdoor education, service, leadership, co-curricular participation, microcredentials, internships and training.

It will be the first of its kind in a Queensland school and a real qualification for a different world.

I will be excited to reveal the full array of 25 strategies in our new Strategic Plan during 2024.

It will sit alongside our Campus Master Plan and set us on a bold trajectory to become the school we want to be – one of Queensland's top coeducational schools by any measure.

These bold strategies can only be delivered by staff with energy, talent, imagination and wisdom, so I am lucky to have an Executive and Senior Leadership Team who are all these things.

I thank Deputy Principal Meagan King, Head of Senior School Rebecca Adamson, Head of Junior School Michelle Leftwich, and our CFO Johan Louw.

And I commend our team of Assistant Heads, Directors, Heads of Faculty, Heads of Houses and Coordinators of activities and programs.

It is a hallmark of our strong culture, that we have

more than our fair share of long-term staff, who remain as committed and engaged as they were on their first day, some 10, 15 or 20 years ago.

I am energised by the dynamic thinking and engagement of our Board of Directors, led by new Chair Toni Bache and Deputy Chair Michael Buckingham.

This refreshed team of Directors are visionary, experienced and want only the best for Canterbury.

They understand our challenges and are the right people to support me getting the big calls right.

The ultimate guide of how well the school is travelling, is not how many national awards we have won, or our ATARs above 90 or 99, or even the number of premierships and eisteddfods won – and our community knows the strength of Sport and Performing Arts here.

It is the calibre of our graduates' character and their ability to step confidently beyond our gates.

I told our Class of 2023 on their final day, that I had full confidence that they were 'World Ready'.

This is the difference that great teachers, wise pastoral care, and deliberate program development can achieve.

To our parents, carers and families, I thank you for your contribution as mums and dads, sporting spectators, audience members, lunch-makers, personal taxi services, shoulders to cry on, and dinner table counsellors.

At the end of another magnificent school year, I pay tribute to you and appreciate your ongoing loyalty and commitment to Canterbury College.

Bullang Mobo: A Strong Tomorrow

Canterbury's official Aboriginal Artwork is titled Bullang Mobo and was created by the very talented Mununjali Wangerriburra artist Waylene Currie from WRLC Arts.

Bullang Mobo means 'A Strong Tomorrow' which beautifully captures our College Motto: Fortior Quo Paratior - The Better Prepared, The Stronger.

It also reflects the strength in unity of Canterbury's huge extended family of past and present students, parents, carers, staff, leaders and the wider Logan community since 1987.

This vibrant artwork showcases a powerful connection between our history, people and purpose, and the spirituality of our campus land.

We are situated on Mununjali and Gugingin Country, home to two of the nine Yugambah clans, who nurtured the land around the Logan, Albert, Coomera and Nerang Rivers for a millennia.

This artwork contains five major elements, with each part holding a special significance.

1. Boomerangs

The corner boomerangs represent the Junior School and Senior School, while reflecting the basic boomerang shape of our campus building network, stretched like arms around the ovals.



They symbolise a solid foundation of student support, with both boomerangs wrapped caringly around the school artwork inside.

The footsteps coming together within each boomerang show our many children from all year levels uniting as one, and forging new pathways for future student generations.

2. Border Artwork

The web of numerous connecting lines and nodes along all four sides and corners represent the huge diversity of families who have travelled here via different means and routes, from right around the world, Australia, Queensland and Logan.



All these pathways connect and interconnect - highlighting our bonds, our unity and shared goal of creating brighter and stronger students for tomorrow.

3. Yarning Circle

This central image symbolises the parents, carers, staff and community coming together to support our children's education, wellbeing and futures as one powerful adult collective.



Joining this core element is the network of illustrated roots that honour our sadly departed historic giant fig tree, which died in 2022 after months trying to save it.

Deeper again at the very heart of the Yarning Circle lies the Anglican Cross - which also appears on our College Crest, symbolising the faith and traditions upon which Canterbury was built.

4. Four Pillars

Our major student offerings of Academics, Sport, The Arts, plus Service And Leadership, are displayed by those four stylised pillars, strategically reinforcing that strong blue circle which enfolds and unites our many different families.



5. Remaining Elements

These bright 'hubs' symbolise the rich diversity of the 80-90 cultures co-existing here on campus, in an open and inclusive educational environment, where children and families from all different backgrounds can call 'home'.

Students were able to create, invent and improve their thinking skills in a fun and educational way.



Year 5: Character Builders Workshop

On Thursday 4 May, in preparation for moving into Year 6 in 2024, our Year 5 students undertook a Character Builders Workshop, which provided strategies for effective team-building and hands-on leadership.

With a significant focus on working outside one's comfort zone, while connecting and creating positive peer culture, plus learning social techniques for effective teamwork, our Year 5s are well on their way to becoming outstanding leaders for their younger peers in Junior School.



Years 5 – 6: Girls The Sacred Sister Project

In Term 1, our Years 5-6 girls undertook The Sacred Sister Project over four weeks as part of their Wellbeing curriculum.

This program covers three main topics: Voice Of Judgement vs Voice Of Wisdom, Mindfulness On Social Media and a Beautiful Bodies/Qualities Exercise.

The program supported our female students to develop proactive strategies to navigate social situations and friendships, and assisted them to be well-positioned for their transition into teenagers.



Year 6: Bridge Builders Mediators Training

Back in Term 1, we appointed 24 of our Year 6 students as 'Bridge Builders' Mediators.

This initiative is part of our Junior School Wellbeing Program, where these students play an important leadership role in encouraging others to solve problems more positively.

Our young mediators participated in a two-day training workshop run by Jocelyne Chirside MEd (Hons), a national Social Emotional Learning consultant from EMPOWERING Life Skills Pty Ltd.

The training aimed to teach students to:

- Recognise conflict and understand their responses.
- Foster an appreciation for differences between people.
- Equip students with better critical thinking and calming techniques, active listening and problem-solving.
- Provide an empowering process for students to assume more responsibility when resolving problems.
- Support the school to develop a safer and happier environment.

Each student was scheduled one lunchtime per week, working in pairs to roam the Prep – Year 2 playground, 'building bridges' among the students and promoting positive interactions.



Years 5 – 6: Boys Rock And Water Program

During Term 1, our Years 5-6 boys engaged in the Rock And Water Program over four weeks, enhancing their Wellbeing curriculum.

This program engaged students in physical team-building activities to assist with developing:

- Practical anti-bullying strategies.
- Alternatives to aggressive verbal and physical responses.
- A better ability to stay in control through grounding, centredness and mental focus.
- Increased self-respect, self-control and self-confidence.
- Enhanced resilience skills and wellbeing.
- Skills to identify and monitor reactive behaviour patterns.

The sessions were also aimed to promote: communication skills, compassion, boundary setting, simple self-defence, life purpose and motivation, intuition, mental strength, empathic and positive feelings, thinking and visualising.





Years 5 – 6: Spark Program

Spark is an elective-based 'hands-on' STEAM: Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics program for Years 5-6 students, unique to Canterbury.

Each semester, our students choose one engaging subject to study, from a wide range of 12-14 topics. Then students from both year levels who select the same option are combined into the one classroom and taught by relevant staff.

Spark is about building curiosity, encouraging students to try something different, and providing an exceptional opportunity for them to embark on their own 'World Ready' learning journey.

Spark happens once per week for two hours, with students encouraged to continue their learning beyond the classroom.

Spark focuses on the Australian Curriculum's general capabilities of critical and creative thinking, personal and social capability, ethical understanding and intercultural understanding.

At the end of each semester, our Junior School hosts a Spark Learning Expo, where the students exhibit their special topic projects to the whole Canterbury community.

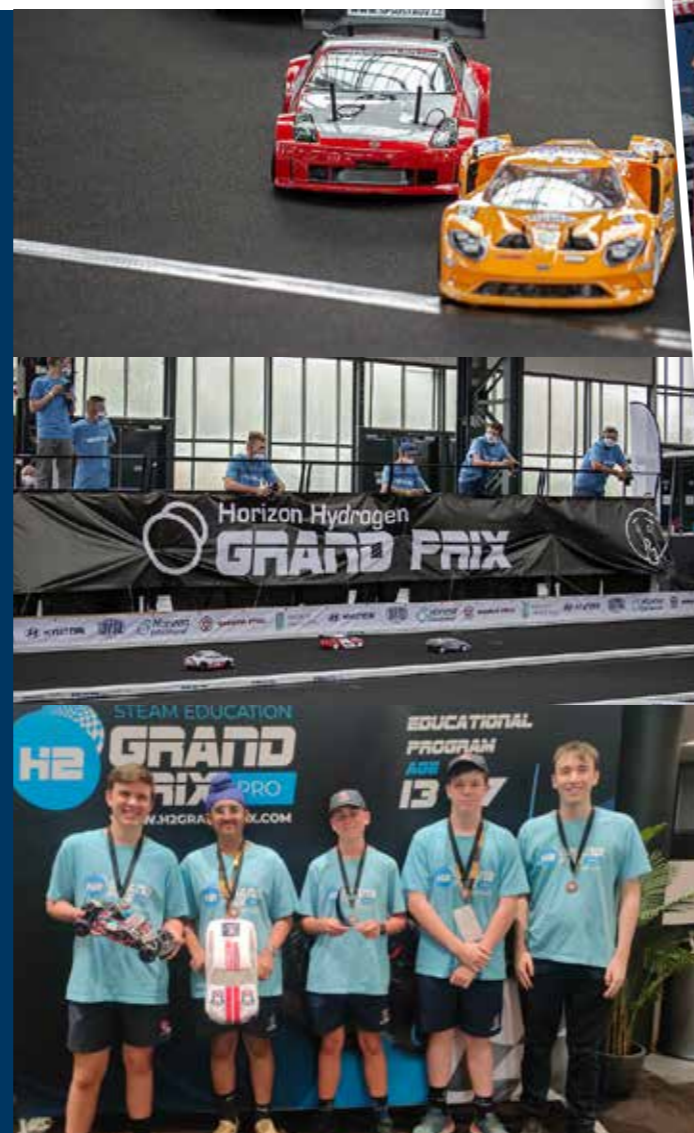
2023 Hydrogen Grand Prix Australian Championships

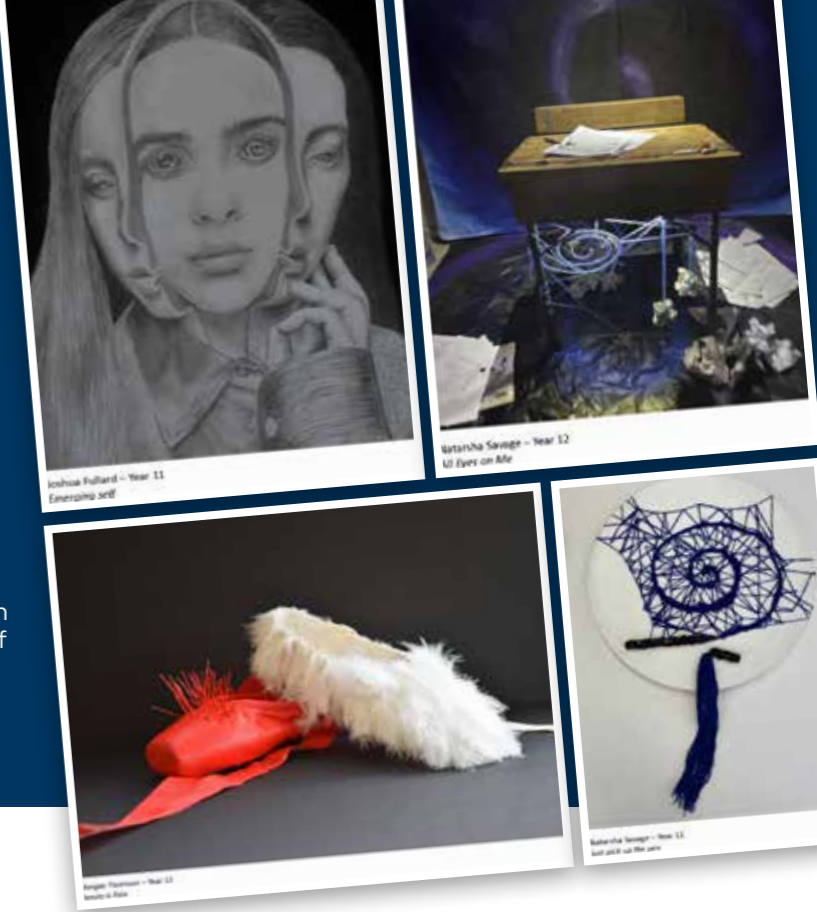


Year 11 Visual Art: Logan Art Gallery Artwaves Exhibition

Next was the official 'Parade Of Nations Flag Ceremony', where students carried the flag of their cultural background through the large crowd and onto the stage for display.

Principal Mr Dan Walker's official address covered how Canterbury College is 'Different Together' – explaining how not being all the same is the school's greatest strength.

That we draw on our different life experiences, stories, backgrounds and values to learn from one another and make our community stronger.



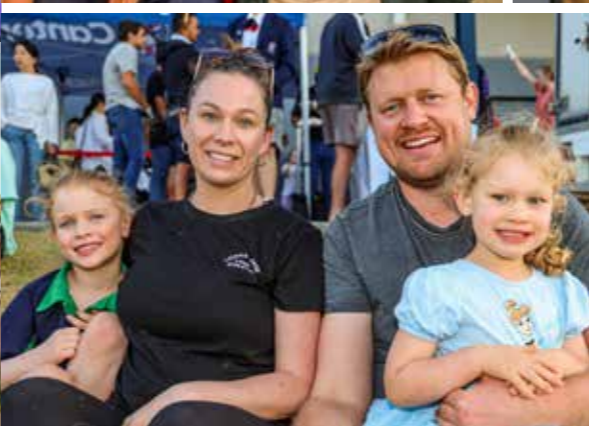

Japan marked Canterbury's first overseas College Tour since COVID, and was open to any students studying Japanese (Years 7-12), Geography (Year 12), Business or Economics (Years 11-12).

Our Japanese Language students put all those months of study to the test, by finding their way around busy cities like Tokyo, and speaking Japanese with the locals.

Our Geography students learnt about creative urban planning and environmental sustainability, with 130 million people living in a nation just 1/20th the size of Australia.

And our Business and Economics students discovered why Japan is still the world's third largest economy, while learning about hydrogen-powered bullet trains and cars, as well as regional trade.

Plus the cultural exchange enabled by visits to Japanese schools in class time, major shrines, historic landmarks, museums and science centres, plus shopping districts and natural wonders.

Girls In ICT Day

On Thursday 27 April with BOP Industries, we hosted a Girls In Information & Communications Technology (ICT) Day in the CEC, an inspiring interschool event highlighting IT career pathways.

Years 5-8 girls from various Logan schools gathered to collaborate in teams, exercise their creativity, and use problem-solving skills to tackle real-world challenges via technological solutions.

During a full day of activities, students heard from female ICT role models through presentations, career stories and a discussion panel, where students submitted the questions.

Girls In ICT Day is a worldwide initiative promoting STEM to school-age girls, encouraging discussions aimed at overcoming any access or safety barriers they face when aspiring to related studies or jobs.

The female share of our total workforce is 47%, yet female participation in ICT remains at just 29%, significantly lower than other comparable occupations.

Canterbury's Girls In ICT Day was supported by our Queensland Government partners at GISP: Gateway to Industry Schools Program, which connects school students to industry leaders and work experience.

As the CEO of his own start-up company - Ashan Industries, he is developing a Neurodiverse Children's App to help communicate with people like his younger brother Vishan who has autism.

Ashutosh did an amazing job presenting and faced some challenging questions from the panel of expert business judges.

Ashutosh received a place in the YouthX Program, which includes a number of funding and mentoring packages valued at \$10,000.

Future Anything is an agency that provides fully resourced, curriculum-aligned programs, student workshops and professional development which supports educators to deliver 'real life' learning.

Their mission is to push young people's entrepreneurial mindset to much higher levels.



Interschool Maths Teams Challenge

On Tuesday 25 July, we hosted the fast-growing 2023 Interschool Maths Teams Challenge in our CEC, with 57 teams from 23 South-East Queensland schools.

This four-hour academic tournament is a major problem-solving event broken into categories for Years 5-12 students to showcase their mathematical knowledge and skills, logical thinking, teamwork and mental strength under time pressure.

Teams are grouped by year levels into Years 5-6, Years 7-8, Years 9-10 and Years 11-12, with a maximum of three students from the older year level and two students from the younger year level.

We look forward to this 'major mathematical milestone' growing yet again next year, after starting with 47 teams in 2022 - all managed by Mr Jason Baber our Maths Teacher maestro.

Interschool Chess Tournaments

All students must play seven games at each tournament, and receive merit badges if they win 4.5 or more matches, while 1st, 2nd and 3rd placed students receive medals (NB: Stalemate = 0.5).

Wellbeing Program

Canterbury's Wellbeing Program recognises that our students are evolving into educated young citizens, and their growth is shaped by various factors other than their academic focus.

It also encompasses their physical, social, spiritual and emotional development.

Our Wellbeing Program is dedicated to nurturing these aspects of our students' lives, aligned with our College Values.

The Year 7s once again worked with the **Unleashing Personal Potential (UPP)** organisation, where they were empowered to forge stronger connections with peers through wellbeing and leadership.

Our girls continued with **The Sacred Sister Project**, which supports them with their transition into Senior School, providing strategies to deal with relationships and mixed emotions.

Year 8 students delved deeper into the concept of respectful relationships, focusing on conflict resolution and leadership skills.

Our Year 9s investigated the scientific basis of mindfulness and the diverse ways they might engage in these, and held discussions about the influence of media on body image.

They expanded on their Year 8 work around respectful relationships, to explore the significance of establishing and enforcing personal boundaries.

Year 10 students spent some time building their study skills, and looked towards future career pathways, based on their interests and strengths via the Careers Department online platform.

They also prepared for their Social with dance lessons and discussed healthy lifestyle habits.

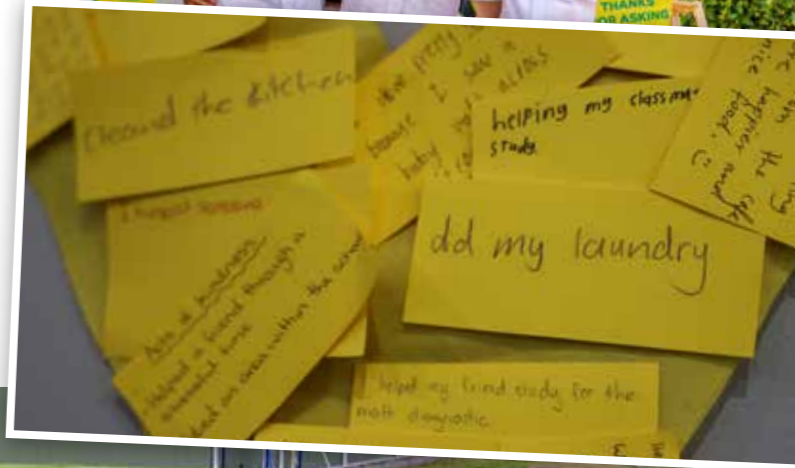
The **RACQ Distracted Driver Program** taught our Year 11s how to keep safe as young drivers.

Community Service: Orange Sky Australia - The Sudsy Challenge Fundraiser

There's nothing like some healthy inter-house or inter-campus competition when it's all for a great cause.

That cause was Orange Sky Australia's annual The Sudsy Challenge - raising much-needed funds and awareness for their free mobile laundry and shower services, partnered with friendly conversation for the homeless.

Orange Sky has provided Australians doing it tough with 1.9 million kilograms of free laundry, 20,000 showers and 330,000 hours of genuine non-judgmental conversation across 36 locations - all boosted by their The Sudsy Challenge campaign.

So at the end of Term 3, our staff and students traded their uniforms for bright orange Sudsy shirts purchased online, and got sponsored to wear these shirts for three days straight, to spark conversations, raise awareness and fundraise for those facing homeless hardships.

Named after the first laundry van 'Sudsy' - built by Orange Sky co-founders Nic and Lucas here in Brisbane, this three-day challenge mirrors the three days and three sets of washing machines and dryers it took to get Sudsy running.

On Friday 28 July, we hosted a Sausage Sizzle BBQ morning tea with four queues of hungry Prep - Year 2 students, waiting at what they described as the 'length of 1,000 sausages' per line.

Then it was our Years 3-6 students' turn at lunchtime for their own Sudsy Challenge Sausage Sizzle BBQ with our Years 5-6 Student Leaders serving their hungry classmates.

Finally, it was Kime House's turn in the Secondary School with their lunchtime BBQ to complete the fundraising trifecta in the Performing Arts Amphitheatre.

Some of our Junior and Secondary students were even featured in a segment on Channel 9's *Today Show*, where they explained the huge effort Canterbury has achieved with Orange Sky Australia over the past three years.

Our College managed to raise a whopping \$34,210 - the highest total of any school or organisation as ranked on The Sudsy Challenge website leaderboard.

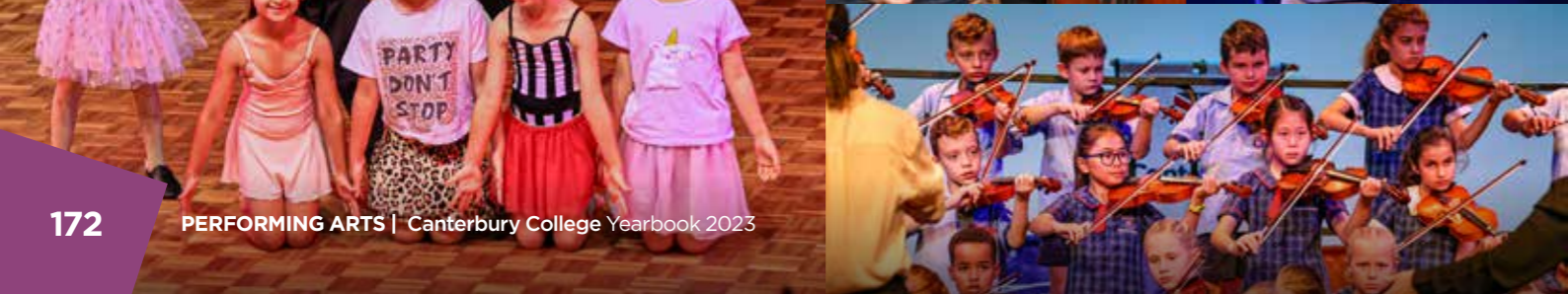

Chamber Music School

Canterbury's Chamber Music School has gone from strength to strength, with our young musicians consistently being recognised on regional, state, national and international stages.

With my appointment as an Honorary Lecturer at UQ, Canterbury now has a new collaborative music partner, and I thank them for recognising my work in the field of youth chamber music.

Our Chamber Music School ensembles enjoyed on-campus performances at Canterbury's five-concert Winter Music Festival in Semester One and Spring Music Festival in Semester Two.

Trio Bellissimo attended a chamber music workshop at Coomera's St Stephen's College, led by Mr Tim Li, Mr David Dalseno and Mr Sam Konise over a busy mid-year school holidays.

Then directly after the Australian Chamber Orchestra Academy in Sydney, Trio Bellissimo travelled to Melbourne where they attended a four-day Monash University Residency, working with the Music Faculty's Mr Blair Harris (cello) and Dr Tomoe Kawabata (piano), and performed in the masterclass of Ms Louise Hopkins - Head of Strings at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama.

They were also invited by Musica Viva Australia to present the Audience Prize at the Grand Finals of the Melbourne International Chamber Music Competition at the Melbourne Recital Centre.

Within two weeks of returning to Brisbane, Trio Bellissimo were invited by the Queensland Youth Orchestras to perform at their Open Day at the Old Museum.

Year 9 student Isabella Oxenbridge had the opportunity to perform in the masterclass of Australia's pre-eminent concert pianist, Mr Piers Lane (AO), back in May at the ABC Studios in South Bank.

Upon hearing her play, Piers invited Bella to perform at the 2023 Sydney International Piano Competition Australian Showcase, featuring rising stars from around Australia.

At the end of August, Canterbury students Rylan Baird (double bass), Luka Roberts (trumpet), Haydn Li (first violin) and George Li (cello), performed over at QPAC as part of the Queensland Youth Symphony's (QYS) 3rd concert of the 2023 season.

QYS is widely recognised as a world-class youth orchestra and is the flagship ensemble of the Queensland Youth Orchestras (QYO).

So we are extremely proud to have four Canterbury students currently playing in the QYS, and at 12 years old, George Li is now the youngest player in the QYS.

Canterbury's chamber music ensembles, and external ensembles with our students, were again successful at the Gold Coast Eisteddfod and inaugural Redlands Youth Chamber Music Festival.

These were held in August alongside the Music Showcase at Customs House in Brisbane, which featured the Senior String Quartet, Volante Trio and Trio Bellissimo.

Li Brothers Excel

Year 10 student Haydn Li made his concerto debut in the Redlands Sinfonia's 2023 season finale at the Redlands Performing Arts Centre, conducted by Dr Graeme Denniss.

Haydn performed as a violin and viola soloist, and is the first ever viola soloist to be invited to perform with the orchestra in its 37-year history.

Haydn also led the Redlands Sinfonia as their youngest ever Concertmaster at 15 years old.

One week after winning 2nd Prize at the Australian Strings Association Queensland Concerto Competition in July, Haydn Li was named Recitalist in the 48th John Curro National Youth Concerto Competition (JCNYCC) for the second year running.

The JCNYCC is the most prestigious competition in Australia for string soloists aged up to 18.

Haydn was given a series of five solo viola recitals around Brisbane during the first week of October, as part of the JCNYCC Finals Week, and then joined the QYS on the violin for the String Sensations Concert on the stages of the Old Museum on Sunday 8 October.

Back in the mid-year holidays, Year 7 student George Li and his older brother Haydn Li travelled to Sydney to attend the Australian Chamber Orchestra Academy.

Led by ACO violinist Aiko Goto, the ACO Academy is an inspirational week of intensive workshops with ACO mentors, for top-level secondary school string students from across Australia.

It culminates in a chamber music concert and a public chamber orchestra performance.

Our two students were the only Queenslanders offered a place via the rigorous audition process.

2023 was a busy but successful year for the Canterbury Rock School.

The various ensembles saw record numbers of musicians and the groups performed at more events across the College than ever before.

The year started with our Music Camp which featured a rock school group for the first time.

Guitar Trio spent their time learning various aspects of music production, home recording and jumpstarting their song repertoire, which led to them performing at the first Assembly of the year.

This was an impressive achievement as this group had an all-new line-up for 2023.

Back on campus, our rock bands began the year with the 'Decades Project'.

They took on pieces from each decade starting with the 1950s moving through to the present day.

Students gained a real perspective of how contemporary music has evolved, as well as discovering new artists and genres.

It also provided a great foundation of material to start their song setlist for the big year ahead.

This song library was put to good use with the extremely popular Loud Lunch campus events.

This included performances from two completely new rock bands that have developed in on-stage confidence and musical skill over the course of the year.

Rock School completed their regular induction sessions as well as hosting masterclasses with guest artist Marty Hailey, an internationally renowned composer, producer and musician.

There were also instrument-specific masterclasses focusing on improving live sound production and getting the most out of your instrument when performing.

2023 saw the continuation of the Open Workshop Series, which offers all Canterbury Secondary School students, the chance to come and experience Rock School for themselves.

They attended in record numbers, with many looking to join Rock School bands on a permanent basis.

The Brekkie Buskers have been ever present around the College, continuing their Tuesday morning performance series at the Yalburru Community Café, but also performing at many College-wide events.

This includes Junior School morning tea breaks, the Mother's Day Breakfast, Pink Ribbon Cancer Council High Tea Fundraiser, Year 12 Graduation Breakfast and the Creative Industries Showcase.

The Canterbury Winter and Spring Music Festivals' Friday Night Rocks concerts are the two showcase events for our Rock School, and this year they certainly didn't disappoint.

These 2.5-hour live free concerts consist of performances from all Rock School ensembles, with students ranging from 7-18 years-old.

The Arts Centre Amphitheatre is converted into a rock venue for the night with full-scale lighting and sound for a large and engaged audience of families, friends, students and staff.

Both events are professionally recorded so that footage can be submitted to the national RockFest Schools Competition.

This year, two of our rock bands reached the final four bands in the country, with 'Breaking News' being nominated for Best Junior Band and 'Second Wave' for Best Senior Band.

Rory Walker also won the RockFest national award for Music Futures.

Rock School also participated in major external events with 'Second Wave' competing in the 2023 Battle Of The Rock Bands interschool competition.

They won Most Outstanding Band Of The Night, as well as two individual awards for Best Vocalist - Rory Walker, and Best Musician - Ashlyn Dinsdale.

Part of their prize included the opportunity for the band to play live at The Triffid venue in December in the showcase encore event.

2023 also saw the completion of the Canterbury Recording Studio's construction.

This project has been planned for some time, and now gives students access to a professional recording facility, that can be used for recording ensembles and soloists.

This will be used by musicians across Canterbury, allowing students to develop original music as well as recording professional audition material, and getting involved in learning the music production process.
